




United States Cavalry

Armies of the world have been using horses and other animals, including camels and elephants, for centuries for transporting troops and equipment and for mounted combat. The English word "cavalry" comes from the French word cavalerie, derived from "cheval" (caballo in Spanish) meaning "horse."

Before the development of modern vehicles, a dragoon referred to a regiment of infantry who traveled on horseback but dismounted to engage in combat on foot. The name "dragoon" comes from "dragon," which was the nickname for an early French wheel-lock pistol. The large barrel of the firearm was often engraved to resemble the head of a dragon so that the muzzle flash made it look as though the dragon was breathing fire.

Before the invention of the stirrup, riding a horse was a bit awkward, as the rider needed to balance in the saddle to keep from falling off. The addition of stirrups for saddles made it much easier for a rider to maintain stability on the horse and also allowed for leverage in the use of weapons such as swords and lances. Although horses were domesticated around 4500 BC, the development of stirrups is believed to have taken place in India and China in approximately 200 BC. Before the invention of gunpowder, the stirrup was considered the single most important development in modern warfare.

Following the invention of the stirrup, mounted combat became common practice in all the major world militaries. Since the mounted soldiers no longer

were required to march for long distances, it became possible to wear heavier body armor and carry heavy weapons. Heavily armed mounted soldiers, such as the European knights were common until the development of firearms and artillery. Heavy armor and weapons proved to be much less effective against

musket fire and cannon shot, and also tired the horses and slowed them down considerably.

By the mid 17th Century, most cavalry in Europe no longer used metal armor. This resulted in the "light cavalry" which remained effective in combat until the early 20th Century when motorized vehicles began to replace horses as a means of transportation for troops and weapons.

The 18th and 19th Centuries were the golden age of cavalry in Europe and the United States. A surprise attack by a light cavalry brigade tended to be swift, sudden, and devastating to an unsuspecting enemy, utilizing the "shock and awe" strategy which is still used in warfare, although in modern times with vehicles and aircraft rather than horses.

On the other hand, a poorly planned cavalry attack, or an attack on an enemy that is well prepared for it could also result in disaster and utter defeat, as General Custer learned the hard way at the Battle of Little Bighorn(?) The term "Death or Glory" was often used to describe the high risk and potential outcome of a light cavalry charge. Contrary to legend, control of the horses tended to be equally important as speed, and attacks at a full gallop were rare.

The last horseback cavalry charge by the U.S. Army was on January 16, 1942, by the Phillippine Scouts of the 26th Cavalry Regiment against Japanese troops on the Bataan Peninsula. Although the 26th was heavily outnumbered and outgunned, the surprise attack was successful in driving off the Japanese. Sadly, due to a lack of supplies, the horses later had to be sacrificed and used for food for the troops.

Today, the 1st Cavalry Division is the only active division in the United States Army that has a cavalry designation, and still carries out cavalry-style missions using armored vehicles and aircraft.



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Sons of the American Legion

The Sons of the American Legion was founded in 1932 with the purpose of honoring the service and sacrifice of U.S. military veterans and Legionnaires. Unlike the Auxiliary, the SAL is not a separate entity, rather it is a subsidiary of the American Legion and allows for more membership eligibility.

The SAL consists of both veterans and the sons of veterans. SAL membership is open to men and boys of all ages who are either veterans or whose parents or grandparents are veterans of the U.S. military. SAL Squadron 161 is very active in our Arvada community and our main mission is to raise money for local charities, with a focus on veterans and children's nonprofit organizations.

One way the SAL raises money is by preparing Sunday buffet breakfasts. Post 161 serves breakfast on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month offering a variety of traditional and specialty breakfast items. Breakfasts are open to the public and nobody leaves hungry.

Our largest moneymaking event of the year is our annual Sons of the American Legion **Charity Golf Tournament** which is held at Lake Arbor every September. The Tournament is also open to the public and we are able to raise several thousand dollars every year for local children's charities. Money raised comes from players, prize raffles and auctions. It's a fun day of golf and games followed by a luncheon at the Post.

The reason for this article is the fact the two Post members that arrange for the disposal of the flags are both in their 80's and we need to set some ground rules. American Legion Post 161 accepts worn and unusable flags for disposal. Individual flags can be put in the mailbox in the Post lobby. Flags picked up somewhere else and delivered in bulk are accepted also.

Now for the RULES and RESTRICTIONS!

We ONLY accept AMERICAN red, white and blue flags for proper disposal! Any state, POW, military

branch and Police flags can be put in your trash at home. We cannot dispose other flags with the proper American flag disposal ceremony.

ALSO VERY IMPORTANT!! PLEASE do not have the flags in plastic bags or garbage bags. These bags cannot be burned so this requires us to have to take them out of bags and put into boxes which can be burned. PLEASE remove any ropes, wood or plastic staffs or anything else attached to the flags. The grommets in the flags are ok.

We usually have 10 to 20 boxes of flags to transport for disposal. If half of these boxes are flags we had to transfer from garbage bags, you can see the extra work required. We do this to insure proper disposal of American flags and as a convenience to our members and the public. We appreciate your cooperation and thoughtfulness as we continue to serve.
